BUSINESS SERVICES

Establishments in the business services sector perform essential activities that are often undertaken in-house by establishments in many sectors of the economy. By consolidating the performance of these activities of the enterprise at one specialized establishment, economies of scale are achieved. Establishments primarily engaged in providing a range of day-to-day office administrative services, such as financial planning, billing and recordkeeping, personnel, and physical distribution and logistics, are part of this cluster.

Many of the companies in this cluster perform routine support activities for the day-to-day operations of other organizations. Activities performed include: office administration, hiring and placing of personnel, document preparation and similar clerical services, solicitation, collection, security and surveillance services, cleaning, and waste disposal services. The activities performed by establishments in this sector are typically on a contract or fee basis.

As with professional services discussed above, business services industries typically cross many industry sectors and offer career pathways for workers with a wide variety of education and skills. Business services industries generally require many more entry-level and middle-skill jobs than in professional services. Twenty-four industry sectors make up the Business Services cluster in Richmond. See Table 2.3 below for the full list of industry sectors. Table 2.3 provides an overview for each of the individual industry sectors that comprise the Business Services cluster in Richmond.

Included are historic, current, and projected employment; historic and projected average annual percent growth (or decline); historic

and current employment concentration (LQ); average earnings; gross regional product (GRP); and jobs multipliers. The table is sorted largest to smallest by 2017 sector contribution to GRP.

The business services cluster accounted for 1,872 jobs in 2017, and has an LQ of 6.7. This means that overall employment for this cluster is 6.7 times more concentrated in Richmond than would be expected based on national employment averages (see Location Quotient within the Introduction). This is consistent with the strong construction and oil and gas clusters in Richmond, as all of these clusters hire large numbers of workers with middle skills and trade skills. As a whole, the cluster experienced strong job growth over the last five years. Because business services are supporting services for other industries and businesses, the growth in this cluster is primarily due to the growth in other targeted clusters in Richmond. The industry is expected to continue to experience stronger than average growth (see Table 2 above) of 17% in total over the next five years. Going forward, along with professional services (discussed above), targeting business service companies for recruitment and expansion help should be a focus for Richmond's economic development efforts.

Total sales for all companies in this cluster were more than 300 million (6% of total regional sales) and the cluster contributed more than \$150 million to the region's gross regional product (6% of total GRP) in 2017.

Among business services industries, a variety of building services – waste collection, landscaping, janitorial, etc. – are the largest

employing sectors in this cluster. All of these sectors added jobs in the years following the recession. Between 2012 and 2017, Richmond moved away from some business services industries and into others. Computer and related equipment wholesalers, other telecommunications (besides wireless), and audio and video equipment products all declined sharply. However, transportation-related sectors grew rapidly. Overall, the number of Richmond jobs in this cluster increased by 17% from 2012 to 2017.

Historically, Richmond businesses in business services sectors have experienced strong growth. In fact, business services activity in Richmond has been much stronger than for either Texas or the U.S. Figure 2.4 shows that the year-over-year (YOY) growth rate for the cluster in Richmond has seen significant growth for nearly 20 years, with even more growth expected. Projections show employment growth in this cluster will remain strong and will grow more in Richmond (17% growth expected in the next 5 years) than for the nation or Texas.

Labor Market Gap Analysis

Table 2.4, on the next page, lists the top 15 occupations in Business Services. These occupations account for two-thirds of all cluster employment. The table provides the number of people employed by

FIGURE 2.4G. BUSINESS SERVICES EMPLOYMENT TRENDS; YOY EMPLOYMENT GROWTH



occupation in the cluster, and the number of people employed in that occupation in all industries in the region. This indicates the level of competition employers may face from industries outside the cluster when hiring for key occupations. Overall, for these 15 occupations, the cluster employs 35% of the people in these occupations in the region. The other 65% are employed by industry sectors outside of the Business Services sector.

The occupations with the most jobs in the business services cluster are drivers, cleaners, and grounds workers. These occupations comprise nearly 30% of the cluster's total jobs. Most jobs in this cluster pay between \$10 / hour and \$20 / hour and as shown in Table 2.5 on the previous page, have no formal educational requirement. At more than \$55 per hour, managers are paid the most and are the single occupation that requires a college education.

There are no entry-level requirements for many positions. (Note that these educational requirements reflect national averages and may differ from specific requirements of Richmond employers.) What makes most of these occupations so valuable is that they provide a significant number of entry-level opportunities and offer on the job training. Table 2.5 shows the average annual openings (averaged over the past five years) for specific occupations within Richmond. Openings are further divided into two categories – openings for replacement jobs (jobs that are open due to retirement or other attrition) and openings for newly created jobs. Most of the entry level jobs in business services have high turnover.

Supply Chain Analysis

Table 2.6, on the next page, provides a picture about the total demand in Richmond by all Richmond residents and businesses for products made by companies in the business services industry cluster—worth a total of nearly \$344 million in the region. Table 2.6 is sorted by the dollar value of demand being met in-region by Richmond businesses. In Table 2.6, we see that the companies in these sectors meet only 27% of Richmond demand for their products, while Richmond imports the other 73% of its needs for these products. This would seem to indicate potential markets for local suppliers. Telecommunication Resellers, for example, supply 66% of local demand, supplying about \$3.7 million of total local demand of \$5.5 million, while \$1.8 million is purchased by Richmond residents and businesses from outside the region. Other industry sectors that could tap into the Richmond market include the following:

- Temporary Help Services
- Landscaping Services
- · Office Administrative Services
- General Freight Trucking, Local
- · General Freight Trucking, Long-Distance, Truckload
- Data Processing, Hosting, and Related Services
- Wireless Telecommunications Carriers (except Satellite)

Table 2.7 shows the economic development opportunity to build up the region's supply chain supporting business services companies. This table shows the goods and services that companies within the business services industry cluster buy to use in creating and offering their products or services. Only 14% of business services supply needs are met within the region, while 86% are purchased from outside. In total, the value of the business services supply chain for Richmond manufacturers is nearly \$133 million. Almost every type of product or service is largely supplied to Richmond's business services industry from outside of Richmond. There are significant opportunities to provide more of the supply chain for Richmond business services companies. Attracting and developing more professional and technical services, more transportation, more

construction, and more arts, entertainment, and recreation appear to be those industries that offer the greatest potential for growth in Richmond.

Table 2.8, on the next page, shows greater detail for major products or services purchased by Richmond business services companies. These are industry sectors which are key suppliers to the business services industry, and account for two-thirds of the sector's total supply chain requirements. More importantly, these are industry sectors that are already established in the Richmond economy or have strong growth or attraction potential because of synergies with other closely related industry sectors or because they require occupations already present in the Richmond labor market.

Table 2.9 shows the amount of goods and services sold by Richmond business services companies both inside and outside the region. These companies sell more than \$308 million of products or services, of which \$214 million is sold outside Richmond, thus bringing substantial revenues into Richmond.

In summary, similar to the professional services cluster, focusing economic development efforts on business services will, in turn, support growth in all the other clusters. Business services encompasses a great variety of types of businesses, which also helps in diversifying the economy. Combining economic development goals of attracting and retaining both business services and professional service companies builds on Richmond's housing and education assets.
